### Message from the President



This year the Northumberland Land Trust is celebrating its Fifth Anniversary! With 430 acres of land being preserved on four properties, we are proud of our achievements. This puts us into the top one third of Ontario Land Trusts when measured by acres of land being preserved.

A great deal of responsibility comes with preservation of land and we need your help in many ways. The urgent need today is for stewardship of the McEwen Property, 100 acres of kame forest on the Oak Ridges Moraine, adjacent to the Ganaraska Forest. Fences have been broken down, allowing access by ATVs which are doing untold damage to the precious wetland on the property. The Prairie Buttercup – ranked as S3, Provincially Significant, rare to uncommon, and several Regionally significant species such as Arrow-leaved Violet, Round-headed Bush-clover are in imminent danger from the activity of these motorized vehicles.

Your financial commitment is needed so that we can do our work. Your commitment as a volunteer is needed—please call us to see when our next “Volunteer Day” is being scheduled.

We invite you to join us on two walks that are planned on our properties. On the Leckey Property on August 22 and on the McEwen Property on October 17. ### Hazel Bird – 1920 – 2009

Hazel Bird was a well-respected and much loved volunteer, then staff naturalist at the Laurie Lawson Outdoor Education centre in the 70s and 80s.

At her death, in-memoriam funds were directed to the Willow Beach Field Naturalists. In memory of Hazel, two directional beige-pink granite rocks have been sand-blasted by Joe Oram, “Carved in Stone”, as indicators at key trail junctions at LLOEC. These will assist some 3,500 students, and staff that attend Outdoor Ed. Classes.



To move these rocks into location, two Percheron horses, each dragging a stone-boat, were up to the difficult task, thanks to Connor Green, a Grade 11 student who is training the horses. The rocks are now firmly in place at LLOEC. You are welcome to visit!

## Invasive Plant Species

What do you know about “Invasive Plant Species” on your land? In your garden? In Northumberland County?

They are typically non-native plants that aggressively out-compete other vegetation. They have no natural predators, parasites or diseases to control them.

**Dog-strangling Vine:** is prolific in Northumberland County. It is a non-native herbaceous perennial, first introduced as an experiment for use as a life jacket filling. It likes open, sunny areas and forms dense colonies, smothering short plants and winding its way up small shrubs and trees, very often killing them.

**Garlic Mustard,** a biennial European species, was intentionally introduced as a culinary and medicinal herb. It likes moist shady areas and competes with our woodland species by flowering and setting seed early and causing native woodland plants to lose vigour.

**Norway Maple** will hybridize, with serious implications for our Canadian sugar maple.

**Manitoba Maple,** is native in the prairies but is not native to Ontario. It should be discouraged due to its ability to form dense stands, spread by seeds and roots.

**Scots Pine** is seriously invasive and should be eliminated or at least controlled at the earliest opportunity.

**Common Buckthorn** is a European shrub that excludes other understorey species. The seeds are spread by birds that eat the purple berries – and you are doubtless familiar with the purple stains on your car during the berry season!

Lastly, not a plant, is the **Emerald Ash Borer** beetle which has the potential to destroy our Ash trees.
